The Importance of the ASL Alphabet

The ASL alphabet is the starting point for sign language communication, especially for a new learner. As one accumulates and assimilates signed concepts, his or her personal "library" of signs grows - in other words, signers begin to develop a set of signs with which they become familiar. But as a part of that process, there are words/concepts that are unfamiliar. Spelling these to a knowledgeable signer, whether hearing or hearing impaired, is a way to communicate as well as request help with learning the sign for the spelled word.

Additionally, some signs incorporate alphabet signs. While this occurs most often in Signed English where some words are initialized (see <http://www.lesstutor.com/eesASLIntro.html>) it does occur in straight ASL as well. For instance, the signer may find a description in an ASL dictionary in which the hand shape is explained as an alphabet letter. Expertise in signing the alphabet is a boon to the signer and in some instances, can even be critical.


- an activity worksheet for spelling your own name using the ASL alphabet,
